

Along with the Events Committee, the PVEC Staff deserves special recognition for the wonderful dinner and professional preparation of the event venue. The staff was instrumental for the overall success of the awards dinner and truly professional in every aspect. In addition, we had volunteers from Marine Corps and Navy units located aboard the base who provided exceptional support to the event and to our guests.

This awards dinner was our first attempt to arrange a celebration more significant than we have hosted had in the past. Our goals were (1) to increase participation of individuals and organizations who are not currently CPHS members and to become more closely associated

with Camp Pendleton base events and personnel to increase membership and sponsorship to; (2) conduct a professional event that reflects favorably on the CPHS and results in an enjoyable event for all attendees; and (3) increase our general funds to better provide support to the base's historical programs.

Although the focus of this event was primarily on the awards dinner, during our planning efforts, the event evolved into a celebration and recognition of the 75th anniversary of the establishment of Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton. To materially recognize this anniversary, the aforementioned challenge coins commemorating this historic milestone were individually presented to guests attending the dinner. September 1942 and the succeeding events after "the Marines landed". Docents of the Rancho Santa Margarita y Las Flores (RSMyLF) non-profit organization, who also support the base's History Museum Branch, were in attendance at the event, outfitted in their costumes reflecting the look of the day. For those not familiar with RSMyLF Docents, they expertly provide educational tours of the Santa Margarita Ranch House which was occupied by the original and subsequent owners of the land and ranch house. In addition to pre-Marine Corps history, we arranged to have the United States Marine Corps Historical Company display uniforms and equipment worn by U. S. Marines from 1942 to present day.

The evening began with a cocktail hour, during which our guests had time to review over 40 items up for silent auction. Some notable items offered in the silent auction were a United States Marines banner and framed photographs of Arnold Palmer and Muhammad Ali. Once the silent auction had concluded, guests proceeded into the grand dining room for the presentations of the awards and dinner.

CPHS President, Dick Rothwell, was emcee for the awards portion of the program; he described each of the three awards, told a bit about the award recipient, and then presented the awards. The first award presented was the Contribution Award which was presented to Mr. Tony Moiso; the second award was the Sponsorship of Year Award which was given to Ms. Judith Burns; and the third award was the Recognition Award was given to former CPHS Vice President, Col Jim Williams, USMC (Ret).

In addition to the awards portion of the event, the program included three speakers. Our guest speaker was California State Assemblymember, 76th District, Rocky Chavez, a retired U. S. Marine Corps Colonel, who sits on the Governor's Military Council. Following Assemblymember Chavez, Ms. Robin Hutton, President of Angels Without Wings, Inc. and author of "Sgt. Reckless - America's War Horse", spoke to the assembled guests. Ms. Hutton spearheaded the development and dedication of a bronze statue and monument of Sergeant Reckless, the famous Korean War horse, at the National Museum of the Marine Corps in Quantico, VA. Along with support of CPHS members, Ms. Hutton had designed and funded the construction of a similar statue aboard Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton. Robin is currently working on placing a similar statue of Staff Sgt. Reckless at the International Museum of the Horse at the Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington, KY as well as one in Yeoncheon County, South Korea. Our third speaker was Robert Kline, former Executive Vice President at 20th Century Fox and co-founder of Lifetime Television, who is producing Continued page 5, Awards Dinner

a documentary film on the 75th anniversary of Camp Pendleton; Robert also showed the audience a trailer of the documentary.

Project Updates

Flagpole Project

We met with representatives from the Camp Pendleton Marine Corps Community Services (MCCS) Logistics Branch to discuss this planned project. Initially proposed as a potential joint construction project between MCCS and CPHS, a determination was recently made that CPHS will undertake the entire project. We're very appreciative for the support that MCCS has given us in the form of drafting up and providing conceptual plans for the flagpole and associated monument project. Our next step will be taking those conceptual drawings to prospective contractors for more detailed engineering drawings and cost estimates. We're optimistic that this project can be completed prior to the base's 75th anniversary flag raising ceremony on Sept. 25.

Preservation of General Pendleton's Two-Star Flag



CPHS was given approval by the base to fund the preservation of Maj. Gen. Joseph H. Pendleton's two-star flag. On March 9, the flag was delivered to the textile conservator, Sharon Shore of Caring for Textiles (Culver City, Calif.), by the Director, Base History Museum Branch. Sharon provided a textile condition report, pre-treatment and treatment plans, and progress updates of the conservation work

being conducted. The scope of the flag conversation includes preliminary examination, surface cleaning, local cleaning with solutions, and stabilization of unrepaired damage (losses to weave). The conservator recommended after treatment that the mounted flag be re-framed in a new wood frame with acrylic glazing (UV barrier type); the History Museum Branch is funding for this expense. We anticipate that the flag will be completed by the end of August 2017.

Las Flores Adobe / Ranch House / Mechanized Museum

Flores Adobe National Historic Landmark special tours are announced as part of the celebration of Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton's 75th Anniversary. The unique circa 1860s two-story Monterey styled adobe was built as a home for Marcus Forster and his family. Las Flores later became one of California's more successful lima bean farms. The Rancho Santa Margarita y Las Flores Docents will host special monthly Anniversary tours on Fridays at the Las Flores site on July 8, Aug. 4, and Sept. 8 in 2017.

Special monthly Saturday tours at the Santa Margarita Ranch House and the Marine Corps Mechanized Museum (MECH) are scheduled for July 9, Aug. 5, and Sept. 9 in 2017. To make reservations for tours of the Las Flores Adobe, Ranch House, or the MECH, email your request at least ten calendar days in advance to MCBCAMPEN_history@usmc.mil or phone (760) 725-5758. Comfortable shoes are recommended for the tours, which run approximately 90 minutes long.


